Class 1: Summary

Written sometime before 66 AD, The Gospel according to Luke is the most chronologically historical. It is also the longest book in the New Testament, and identified as a synoptic (similar) gospel along with Matthew and Mark. Its authorship is soundly attributed to a physician named Luke who worked closely with Paul. He was likely a Gentile (due to what and how he wrote). The Gospel is addressed to Theophilus, a Greek name translated, "lover of God". This suggests that the addressee could be to all who love God. The first readers would have been Christians in Asia and Europe, who were Gentiles. Luke's style of writing is precise and accessible, making it easy for anyone to see that Jesus is the Savior and the need of man to be saved by Him. This book is the first of two narratives; the second being the book of Acts, The author emphasizes the "role-model" humanity of Jesus, and portrayed Christ as the "Son of Man," a description which appears more than two dozen times in the gospel.
